"We love others as we want to be loved. It is what we do...."

In one of my devotional books the entry for January 18 shares a story from India called *The Spider and the Sage*. (I confess to being partial to stories from India since I have been there several times on mission trips.) Let me share it with you as it is told in my book:

A kind, quiet man prays in the Ganges River every morning. One day after praying, he sees a poisonous spider struggling in the water and cups his hands to carry it ashore. As he places the spider on the ground, it stings him. Unknowingly, his prayers for the world dilute the poison.

The next day the same thing happened. On the third day, the kind man is knee deep in the river, and sure enough, there is the spider, legs frantic in the water. As the man begins to lift the creature, the spider says, "Why do you keep lifting me? Can't you see I will sting you every time, because that is what I do?" And the kind man once again cups his hands about the spider, replying, "Because that is what I do."

I share this story because in reading it on this cold January night my heart is warmed. Why? Because it reminds me of what we are asked to do as people of faith and as disciples of Christ. How many times have you waded into the waters of trying to help others only to be stung by those you are trying to help? How many times have you offered love and the best you are to someone only to have them betray you in a most harsh and mean-spirited way, doing their best to injure you? How did you respond? Sting back? Walk away swearing never to put yourself at such risk again?

As followers of Christ, we are often called to reach out and lovingly cusp our hands around those who are so hurt by the world that all they can do is "sting" others in response, even those who try to help them. While the sting hurts, there is no question what our response as followers of Jesus is to be: to keep offering our hands of protection and comfort and love. To many it seems crazy. They just don't understand, it is what we do….




