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"Many Hands Make Light Work"

The title of this article contains an old favorite saying I have heard many times in my life in the Church. I have never doubted the truth of it. But, during my days serving at First Christian Church in Omaha, Nebraska, I followed with interest a story covered by the local media over a period of months that illustrates the point in an extraordinary way.

At issue is a dilemma confronted by a farmer by the name of Herman Ostry, soon after he bought a piece of land near Bruno, Nebraska (about an hour northwest of Omaha). His new purchase had a big problem. You see, one of the nice selling points of the land was a very nice barn that was included. However, as Mr. Ostry would soon learn, every time it rained a lot, the nearby creek would rise, and the barn would be flooded. Several attempts were made at solving the issue, including digging trenches to divert the water, but nothing really worked. After one spring storm which again caused the creek to flood, Mr. Ostry found his barn 29 inches underwater.

Exasperated, he half-jokingly said to his family, "I bet if we had enough people, we could pick up that barn and carry it to higher ground." Which reminds me of another favorite saying: "Be careful what you ask."

One of Mr. Ostry's sons put his mind to work. He did a careful survey of the barn, noting the number and sizes of the boards and timbers. After consulting with some local carpenters regarding what to allow for the weight of the materials (including nails) he concluded that the barn weighed-in at roughly 19,000 pounds. After some more consultations and calculations, he determined that with 344 of their best friends, they could pick the barn up and move it to higher ground!

Well, that may be. But there is another problem: "How do that many people get a grip on the barn in order to lift it? Is that even possible?" Mr. Ostry's son put his mind to work again and designed a grid of steel tubing and attached it to the inside and outside of the barn, thus providing handles to get a grip. (Are these people for real? Maybe the barn isn't the only thing "needing a grip!")

Amazingly, over time Mr. Ostry was able to get some traction with friends and towns folk about his crazy idea. He even managed to get his unique version of a "barn-raising" included as part of Bruno's Centennial events planned for the next summer. Word got out and spread far and wide about this seemingly impossible idea.

The day for the planned "barn raising" finally came. (On this point I am a little fuzzy, but I believe it was late July or early August in 1987or 88). It turns out that Mr. Ostry had his pick of participants as thousands of people from eleven states showed up. Volunteers were interviewed and sorted with the 344 most likely to be helpful in the task identified, each with a back-up in case of no-shows or those who thought better of what they were trying to do. The moment of truth finally came. With several people on bullhorns shouting in unison, they counted: "One, two, three, LIFT!" – and "344 of their best friends" did just that – and the barn rose off the ground as if it were no big deal. The thousands gathered to witness the event cheered and applauded raucously as the barn was not only lifted but carried about a hundred and fifty feet to its new prepared position – far from the flood zone of the creek – as if it were no effort at all. Gently it was lowered in place. The whole operation took about 3 minutes.

Yes! It is true! If you get enough people to work toward a common goal, spreading out the load evenly and equally, and in coordination with one heart, one mind, one purpose — you can seemingly achieve the impossible. But be sure you do not miss the lesson. The real work is in the preparation: the research, the calculations, the promotion of your idea, helping others see your vision, and listening as the wisdom of others helps to refine it.

Hmmm, it makes me wonder, what "barn-raising" ideas might be in the future of Linwood Christian Church? Got any thoughts?


