#### What to do about those Lenten blues...

So, how's it going with keeping those Lenten disciplines going? Yeah, mine lasted about 3 days this year. I think my record is somewhere around 12 days before my Lenten promises fall to the wayside. Oh well, there's always next year!

Confession time: I did not grow up in a tradition where Lent was observed. All I knew was that some people chose to give up chocolate for 40 days, most of which they spent feeling pretty miserable. We didn't observe pancake day in my family either; I still don't know why. My introduction to that was at the house of my grade-school friend who was from the Roman Catholic tradition. I walked into his house after school one year the Tuesday prior to the beginning of Lent to find multiple pans were engaged in a production line of hot goodies that were cooked, flipped and generously sprinkled with lemon and sugar before we fell on them with gusto and a fork. I was hooked and began to wonder why my family wasn't Catholic? That night I tried to talk my parents into converting, but they firmly said, "No!" It was an early lesson for me that Protestants have less fun.

Lent is, in many ways, the equivalent of Advent in so far as it is also a season of preparation, waiting, expectation and reflection before one of the two major events in the Christian calendar. While Christmas is a soft-focus affair of open fires, family togetherness, feasting and gifts, Easter (at least before we get to the bunny that delivers chocolate eggs part) includes uncomfortable stories of betrayal, aloneness, nails, blood and death. Thankfully, the events of Good Friday give way to the celebration of Resurrection Sunday when Jesus' victory over sin and death opened the way for us to have a deeper, richer, more intimate relationship with God that would no longer require sacrifice of any sort, ever again – well, at least until Lent rolls around again next year – or the church needs a new furnace.

For this reason, I find myself somewhat irritated with Lent. Heresy? I don't think so. It just feels too self-focused for my liking – about what I can achieve, as if that somehow makes me more worthy of God's love and attention. It can appear to be all about my own self-effort; works rather than faith.

Setting aside time for connecting with God, for self-reflection and realigning ourselves with God's ways while intentionally leaning in to hear God's voice more clearly, are all worthwhile; but why confine them to these 40 days? We could equally say the same of Advent. Surely we'll want to explore these significant themes thoroughly throughout the year if one is making it a priority to walk more closely with God.

Furthermore, the idea that my foregoing something as inane as chocolate or television is somehow a *sacrifice* doesn't sit comfortably with me given all that Jesus put on the line on our behalf. Will abstaining from certain things during Lent help me focus on God? Maybe; so it *could be* worthwhile. Will setting personal preferences aside free up time to spend with the teachings of Jesus instead? Almost certainly! But. it still seems rather a feeble offering in the light of God's lavish love and generous mercy. Besides, baseball season is about to start and all those games will be on TV!

So, if your initial promise for the Lenten season has already been broken, please know you are forgiven. God has already forgiven far worse offenses. So, what to do? My advice is simply this: spend the rest of the time between now and Easter and the rest of your life focused more on God and less on you. After all, the depth of our faith rests not on how we integrate God in our lives a couple of seasons a year, but in how we do so daily.
