I remember several of my costumes vividly. (NOTE: I never wore a "store-bought" costume in my life. It was always something I either figured out from what we had at home, or something my mother would be able to make from stuff she had in her scrap box.) I was a "hobo" one year (probably not politically correct in today's world). I was a "Knight of Camelot" another (one of my favorites). I was Robin Hood one year (although I refused to wear green tights), Davy Crockett another, and a baseball player the last year I dressed up. (Not much of a stretch.)

I remember school costume contests and parades and lots of games and activities that were pure fun. The best part, of course, was Halloween night – dressing up in costume and wandering the neighborhood, "Trick or Treating" with my friends. I remember we prized the homemade treats the most. A chocolate chip cookie, rice-crispy bar, or popcorn balls were always the best!

The world today is very different. Costumes are less creative (in my opinion). Most are purchased or rented and tend to be much more gory or suggestive of violence and the darker side of Halloween. Most schools do little or nothing to encourage or observe the holiday.

The world today is also more dangerous. When I went trick-or-treating, my parents simply patted me on the back and said, "Have a good time!" – then sent me on my way knowing that I would be safe traveling in an ever-changing group of friends and neighborhood kids. Today's parents might be charged with gross negligence or even child-abuse for doing the same, and with good reason.

Now, before you think this is wishing for the "good old days" to return, it is not. Times are different from when I was a kid growing up. A lot of changes and precautions followed by today's families are well-warranted, unfortunately born of terrible Halloween experiences from more recent years. No, I am not calling for a return to the past (as if that were possible anyway). But, perhaps it is time for a change in the way we think of and celebrate Halloween – especially in the church.

Perhaps it is time to remember that it is called "Halloween" because it falls on the eve of All Hallows or All Saints Day. In other words, it is truly a church holiday, set aside for the Christian community to honor that "great cloud of witnesses" gone before us. A time to honor people who've lived good lives and sometimes sacrificial lives in their service to other Christians and other peoples. That being the case, it begs the question: "Why don't we dress our kids up in costumes representing these good folks and take them out on All Hallows Eve to do good works?" Why skeletons, and ghouls and goblins, or "headless horsemen?" (Sorry Irvington....)

As an alternative to gathering goodies, we could choose to put together packages of candy and gifts and take our little angels to a nursing home or go around giving gifts to the elderly and the infirmed. Let's have some "Pumpkin Carols" written that honor the saints of the past rather than the "Great Pumpkin." Instead of extorting candy from our neighbors, maybe we could celebrate by offering good deeds to our neighbors, a hug to a grandma or grampa who (quite commonly these days) lives a long way from their grandchildren. How treasured do you think such a gift might be?

Please understand, I'm not trying to take the "fun" out of Halloween. I'm all for having fun – lots of it in fact. But, maybe, just maybe, we could change the focus a bit without sacrificing the fun. Instead of dressing up as "ghouls," we should dress up as "fools" for Christ. Or, maybe, I have just become old and crotchety.
